Jessie Ipock, Veterans Administration HUD-VASH Program: The HUD-Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) program combines HUD's Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) rental assistance for homeless Veterans with case management and clinical services provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). VA provides these services for participating Veterans at VA medical centers (VAMCs), communitybased outreach clinics (CBOCs), through VA contractors, or through other VA designated entities. Congress has appropriated additional funding for new HUD-VASH vouchers every year since 2008: Jessie was invited by Joe Plant to speak about the VA's HUD-VASH to which our Chapter

partners with to support veterans who experience homelessness. The program's priority is to

provide housing to homeless veterans and get them off the streets. Our Chapter gets four to six

calls monthly to work with HUD-VASH to provide emergency funds for housing rent, utility


payment and food. The VA program typically provides support from one to four months of direct support.

Today the fall leaves are starting to drop, the geese are returning in numbers...and God's earthly plan for my daughter, Michelle, is over...She left her trial of pain and suffering from a rare form of cancer (Sarcoma, actually) after a 5-year battle yesterday, October 19, 2021...Her birthday was to be the 22nd of October.

She took her first breath on October 22, 1969...during a commercial break on the Marcus Welby TV show...She

like me was a big baby...close to 10lbs even...Her Mom was 5' 1/2" tall. A C-section was planned but as the Obstetrician and I were in the brake room he said "OK after the commercial. We'll check again"...and she got born at that time!!

The next (almost) 52 years were full, events ...divorces...dedications to family...And at one point her husband Dean dropped from heaven and was her saint for some years forward through literally "in sickness and in health"...A great blessing for her...and me too... When in Colorado...at least, Michell was constantly devoted too dollars ...and projects...raising hundreds of thousands for them...She was cofounder of the HONOR BELL FOUNDATION...that honors the fallen at final services...Perhaps my greatest contribution from Army service is that it opened the gate for her for her veteran's work...There is so much more...There is so many lives that she touched...a light has gone out on Earth...and we pray one has gone on in a higher place...Love from her and me to you / Be well / Bob

CELEBRATION OF LIFE MICHELLE MALLIN "HAPPINESS NEVER DECREASES BY BEING SHARED" – BUDDHA AND THAT'S WHAT MICHELLE PRACTICED DAILY!

Michelle and I met when the Honor Bell was a thought in progress between her and Lou. He was a member of MOPH 1041 and asked that we brain-storm along with them. Immediately, I noticed that Michelle was a no nonsense driven lady with a plethora of forward-thinking ideas. You know the results of *their* dream "forged from honor" a 1000 lb. bronze bell casted along with artifacts from 12 local deceased veterans. A few years later i had the pleasure of having breakfast and interviewing Michelle for an article called "The Citizen Heroes." And yes, this was the beginning of a beautiful friendship!

Michelle was originally from, Syosset New York and for a short time lived in Alaska. While in high school, she was considered a nerd. Just so happened that the team captain and star quarterback needed special tutoring to pass his science labs and other academic topics. Michelle stepped forward and helped him all the way to graduation. He nicknamed her "Lou." Lou the nerd was never bullied. She graduated with an MS degree from the State University at Albany, New York. Later she earned a degree in publishing from Pace University.

The military runs in her family. Her father, Dr. Mallin, was awarded a Purple Heart and Bronze Star. Her very loyal husband, Dean, was in the Navy and currently works at the VA Medical Center in Denver.

At one point, my wife was probably thinking that Michelle was the other woman in my life. Kathleen constantly heard about Michelle. Oh, another tid-bit – somehow, she found the time to house canines, in her home for soldiers that were overseas until they returned.

One of my fondest and last memories was when three couples (Rich and June Eisenberg, Dean and Michelle and Kathleen and I met at the Bagle Deli. Rich is currently battling cancer and that's why they aren't here that evening. They send their love and sympathies to the family. At that dinner, not one word of illness was spoken. We just talked, laughed, and argued about what was best to eat. When I got home that evening there was an email (you guessed it – from Michelle) with at least 20 other restaurants to visit. I'll leave you with this quote from John Quincy Adams that also describes Michelle.

BREAKING NEWS: U.S. Marine Corps Headquarters has issued orders today to Master Gunnery Sergeant S. Claus, recalling him to active duty, with a RNLTD of 24 Dec 2021. MGySgt. Claus, known to use the alias "Saint Nicholas", "Kris Kringle", "Father Christmas", or simply "Santa", is a reserve Marine with 1,745 years of service. He specializes as a tactical operator of the next generation DEC-25B, Cargo Airborne Delivery (CAnDY) Carrier. The DEC-25B is contractor-modified and fully equipped with Cargo Antlered Navigation Equipment Sensors (CANES). It has also been retrofitted with eight high-powered, air-cooled Rangifer Tarandus carrot-fed generators. As a single seat cargo delivery platform, it is capable of vertical delivery of high-value items, take-off and landing without pilot-controlled lighting (PCL). These unique specifications, coupled with the additional Public Affairs skill sets possessed by Master Gunny Claus, classify the entire deployable package as a low-

density, high-demand (LD/HD) asset. Also recalled, were MSqts Dasher and Dancer, GvSqts Prancer and Vixen, SSgts Comet and Cupid, Cpl. Donner, and PFC Blitzen (recently selected for LCpl.) PFC Rudolph is also authorized to report for duty; however, he must first successfully complete his Phase II SERE Training, which he has failed three times due to a medical condition related to his nose. Although the above Marines are on orders for only 24 hours, it is anticipated that they will submit a travel claim for 24,901 miles at .56/mile. using a POV. Suitable Government transportation is not available. As a special operations unit, each member is granted a high level of uniform flexibility, as well as relaxed grooming standards. Per diem has been modified to include large quantities of hot cocoa and cookies. Government travel card use has been authorized. And he will be in a Toys For Tots distribution center near you. Captain Lawrence R. Adams braved overwhelming enemy fire multiple times to rescue a Force Recon Team off the jungle floor, by dangling a ladder out the back of his helicopter.

In January 1969, team Forefather from 1st Force Recon was trapped in the jungle. One helicopter swooped in for an emergency extraction but was shot up so bad it had to crash land back at base. Captain Adams and his crew volunteered to take over the extract. Marines rigged up a cable ladder, never before used by Marines in combat. Adams dangled the ladder out the back of his CH-46, 80 feet above the ground. NVA on a hill above the extract site had a level shot straight at the chopper. Five Marines made it onto the ladder before Adams took off. He didn't know three more were still on the ground. He dropped off the five and returned to the scene. Enemy fire shot the helicopter out of the area twice before he established a hover on the third attempt. The three Marines made it onto the ladder, and Adams pulled away back to base.

For his unwavering resolve and bold initiative rescuing the entire team from certain death, as well as his crew aboard the chopper, Adams was nominated for the Medal of Honor. The award was downgraded to the Navy Cross. Other Marines involved in the "Flying Ladder" mission were awarded 2 Silver Stars and 2 Purple Hearts. Adams served one tour in Vietnam. In that time, he flew over 1,000 missions and 600 flight hours. In addition to the Navy Cross, he earned a Silver Star, 2 Distinguished Flying Crosses, and 50 Air Medals (yes 50).

NATIONAL LAO-HMONG MEMORIAL

In 1961, while the Vietnam War was going on, another war was also waged. This war was known as the "Secret War" and took place in Laos. The countries involved in the Secret War were the U.S., Thailand, Laos, and North Vietnam. The U.S. needed a way to help the fight against communism in Laos. The U.S. CIA recruited the Laotian Hmong and trained, paid, and provided military weapons to them; for the purpose of engagement in guerrilla warfare against the North Vietnamese. Hmong soldiers rescued downed American pilots from enemy territories and defended American outposts in Laos. They also attacked many North Vietnamese convoys that were using the Ho Chi Minh trail, which crossed Northern Laos from North Vietnam into South Vietnam.

30,000 Hmong and 728 Americans and their allies died during the Secret War. When the U.S. withdrew its troops from South Vietnam in 1975, they also withdrew the training teams, military weapons, and financial support from Laos and the Hmong. 10,000 Hmong managed to escape to refugee camps in Thailand and eventually emigrated to the U.S. and other friendly countries. 90,000 stayed behind and suffered the consequences. In Colorado, about 3,000 people of Lao-Hmong descent live, work, and take pride in being U.S. citizen.

The National Lao-Hmong Memorial Foundation of Colorado was formed to establish a compelling memorial that honors the service and sacrifices of the "Lao-Hmong people" (Lao, Hmong, Lue, U-Mien, and Thi Dam), during and following the U.S Secret War in Laos. It will be located in Westminster, Colorado, adjacent to the U.S. Armed Forces Tribute Garden at the City Park, East of U.S. 36 on 104th Avenue between Christopher Fields and Big Dry Creek and is expected to be completed towards the end of 2022.

Recently, a memorial design unveiling event was held at the Broomfield Regional Airport on October 2, 2021. Larry Peterson of VVA Chapter 1075 (Colorado Springs) attended the event. An Air Force Vietnam War veteran, Larry spent time in 1971 at the Nakohn Phanom Royal Thai AFB supporting Lao-Hmong pilot training on the T-28. He also did 123 combat missions on an AC-130 gunship supporting Hmong ground forces in Operation Barrel Roll (Northern Laos). Larry shared the following pictures of the event.



Hotel Scam

Creativity wow.!! This is one of the best scams I've heard about. You arrive at your hotel and check in at the front desk. Typically, when checking in, you give the front desk your credit card (for any charges to your room) and they don't retain the card. You go to your room and settle in.

The hotel receives a call, and the caller asks for (as an example) room 620 - which happens to be your room.

The phone rings in your room. You answer and the person on the other end says the following: 'This is the front desk. When checking in, we came across a problem with your charge card information. Please reread me your credit card numbers and verify the last 3 digits numbers at the reverse side of your charge card.' Not thinking anything wrong, since the call seems to come from the front desk you oblige. But actually, it is a scam by someone calling from outside the hotel. They have asked for a random room number, then ask you for
